A MESSAGE FROM OUR

Executive Director + Board President

This year saw a deepening of our understanding of what it means to belong. Many more clients found us and connected with the Centre. We have worked to create an environment of caring support in which clients, staff and volunteers feel a growing sense of community. For many, CSC Chigamik CHC has become a welcome refuge.

After launching our twenty year vision and strategic plan last year, we are excited to see our plans for improved community health and well-being coming into action. We have been responsive to the findings of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada, holding steady to our commitment to

Traditional Healing. We piloted a system navigation role for the Francophone community with success, and we cared for many clients having social and medical complexities.

We saw the North Simcoe Community Health Links project use the Canadian Index of Wellbeing to help us better understand who among us is most vulnerable and why they are so very fragile. The tool helped us redesign care pathways, which helped redirect many of those individuals away from multiple acute care visits and toward more community based care. In many cases, the first step involved finding stable housing.

At the request of the North Simcoe Muskoka Local Health Integration Network, we worked with many partners to develop an exciting concept into a promising formal proposal for a Community Health Hub that would see the Penetanguishene campus of the Georgian Bay

General Hospital repurposed. We were also happy to collaborate with the Town of Midland to finalize the location for our permanent site, in the Grove of Edgehill Park – a vital partnership with Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care's outpatient and community programs.

The Board is very proud of the staff and all that they accomplished this year. The clinical team embraced the notion of Advanced Access, which aims to ensure our clients have near same day access to physicians and nurse practitioners.

Clinic programs had a big impact on clients, with programs such as Breast Feeding Drop-In Group and Foot Care Clinic, and Elevate Your Mood. Meanwhile, the Community Health Team expanded programming into many corners of the community with programs such as Dance Therapy, Kitchen Talk, Mindfulness Meditation, the Quit Café, and The Good Food Box, to name a few.

The Board, re-invigorated with new members, sought

to understand food insecurity through the work of Valerie Tarasuk. Theirs was a journey toward understanding the precarious reality that many of the Centre's clients face each month, and it sparked a thirst for knowledge, a desire for increased advocacy around issues of equity, access and poverty, and has fostered a deeper commitment to the values, mission and vision of the Centre.

We are blessed with dedication from volunteers and staff that allow us to create pathways to wellbeing that previously did not exist. This is true community transformation, especially for those who struggle the most with their health and wellbeing.

We would like to thank the entire staff, volunteers, clients, families, and our community partners for contributing to a rich and rewarding year at the Centre.




